



CANCER: WHAT IS THE ANSWER - PART IX CHALLENGES FACING CANCER SURVIVORS

Now that you know most cancers are treatable and even curable, the general advice to cancer survivors is "prepare to live the rest of your life." Many cancer centers have a ritual of celebration when a patient has finished their primary therapies and the cancer is controlled. However, the transition from the end of treatment to the next phase in life and future itself does present a few challenges.

The story of Tom, one of my patients, is noteworthy. At the age of 52, he presented with a little hip and thigh pain that turned out to be from "osteogenic sarcoma," a serious type of bone cancer. After

extensive surgery followed by adjuvant therapy at Moffit Cancer Center and subsequent rehabilitation stretching over a few months, he came to my office in a wheelchair with a prosthetic leg. "I am cured of cancer now but I have to wear this long prosthetic leg for the rest of my life. My wife drove me here today," he said. Over the next year, he learned to walk normally with his heavy prosthesis and even drive his car. In other words, he had fully adjusted to his new life as a cancer survivor. He reorganized his job too – from a travelling insurance salesman to an office-based manager, so he can settle down and work in one place

An essential prerequisite for a good, happy life after cancer is to take charge of all your affairs and bring a sense of control in life. You will do everything to lead a healthy life and not become obsessed with recurrence. According to Richard C Frank, M.D., a renowned cancer specialist and author, "The five major elements of preventing cancer and surviving the disease are to remember, 'Survival is spelled LMNOP'." Here is what it means.

- **1.** L is for low fat diet: As I have mentioned before, many diseases, including heart disease and cancer, tend to occur in those who consume a high-fat diet that often leads to obesity, a causative factor in cancer. Saturated fat in your diet, especially red meat, is one culprit.
- **2. M** is for more fruits and vegetables. They are a good source of vitamins like vitamin C and folates, minerals like potassium and a rich source of fiber that helps to maintain the health of your gut and prevent constipation. It also reduces the risk of bowel cancer.

(M, in my lingo, is also for Meditation that can help lessen your, pain, anxiety, depression, fatigue and insomnia, all too common in cancer patients.)

- **3. N is for 'No Smoking.'** You already know 'tobacco abuse in any form' is a leading cause of cancer and stopping this bad habit will reduce the incidence of cancer significantly. Smoking can cause cancer in any part of the body -- not only the lungs but other organs like throat, stomach, urinary bladder, etc. can also be affected.
- **4. O is for organizing your life:** Choose your oncologist and cancer center that you like and can relate to. Your oncologist will be your trusted adviser and help make important decisions. And chose a cancer center closer to home. If necessary, get a second opinion, especially if you have a complicated cancer, so you won't have any cause for repentance. Prepare a living will and trust ahead of time. Organize a support system: you will need a few close friends and relatives to help you with your household chores, transportation, shopping, etc. Organize your finances so you don't run out of money. And finally, learn time management skills you need ample time for running around to doctor's offices, hospitals and labs in addition to your personal needs.
- **5. P is for physical exercise.** Yes, you may be tired and drained after a session of chemotherapy or recent hospitalization but do what you can to keep the body moving. Simple walking is one of the best forms of exercise but you can do stationary bicycle, gentle swimming, etc. if you feel up to it. Ultimately, you need to learn to live with the cancer diagnosis, manage the recurrences without despair and keep a positive outlook in everything you do. Even if you don't get a total cure, you can convert it into a chronic disease like coronary heart disease or chronic bronchitis that can be kept under control with medications. Consider each day is a gift and live to the fullest extent.



BEWARE OF CON ARTISTS IMPERSONATING ICE OFFICERS

As has happened in prior years, there has been an uptick of reports regarding individuals impersonating U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officers or staff tricking people into giving them personal information or money. The Tampa U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) community relations office shares the following from the Federal Trade Commission. We have had several calls from clients in the local area, so we hope this will be useful to our readers. If you got a call from ICE, you're not alone. (And,

for the record, it wasn't them.) Scammers are pretending to be from ICE and USCIS. Like other government impersonators, they want to trick you into giving them your money or personal information.

Here's how the scam often goes: They call or email saying you've violated immigration law. Or that your identity information is wrong or out of date. Or that you owe fees or need to pay an immigration bond. They'll threaten to alert the police or to have you deported if you don't give them the information they want. And they'll tell you not to talk to anyone else about it — which means you can't double-check their story.

All of this can be unsettling. So, if you come across this scam, here are some things to know:

- ICE and USCIS never call out of the blue and demand money. So, if the caller wants you to pay a fee or share personal details like your date of birth or bank account numbers, hang up. It's a scam.
- ICE and USCIS never accept payments using gift cards, cryptocurrency or wire transfers. If someone asks you to pay this way, it's a scam. Always.
- Don't trust caller ID. Scammers can make their phone numbers look real even if they're not. Sometimes, they'll have you look up their number to confirm it's what's listed on the agency's website even if it matches, it could be a trick.

• Check with ICE or USCIS if you're unsure about whether a call or email is real. Never call back phone numbers in caller ID or left in voicemails or emails. Instead, type the agency name into a search bar and click on their webpage to find contact information.

GREEN CARD THROUGH REGISTRY - A NEW PROPOSAL

Registry is a section of immigration law that enables certain individuals who have been present in the United States since January 1, 1972, the ability to apply for a Green Card (permanent residence), even if they

are currently in the United States unlawfully. All you have to show is that you entered the U.S. before Jan. 1, 1992 and have lived here continuously since then. You would also have to show that you have not been convicted of certain types of crimes, that you have resided in the U.S. continuously since you entered and have been a person of good moral character.

There are not many who qualify because of that date: Jan. 1, 1972. It is too far in the past. However, on July 20, 2022, a new bill was introduced in the House

of Representatives entitled "Renewing Immigration Provisions of the Immigration Act of 1929." This would update the registry provision by moving the eligibility cutoff date so that an applicant may qualify if they have been in the U.S. for at least seven years instead of since 1972.

If this becomes law, it would bring relief to millions of people in the U.S. without legal status. So, the question becomes, what are the chances of this proposal becoming law? Unfortunately, with the current political situation in Congress, the prospects are not good, but potential applicants can hope it leads to something eventually.

ARMADA PLATINUM BOASTS OFF-ROADING PROWESS

THE RIDE: Four-door, up to eight-passenger full-size 2022 Nissan Armada Platinum 4WD SUV.

DOWN THE ROAD: Ensconced on a heavy-duty, body-on-frame structure, the power in the Armada is abundant to propel the 6,000-pound-plus vehicle. The ride is quiet and graceful whether you are on the highway or testing the Armada's off-road talent.

TECH & PERFORMANCE: A 5.6-liter V-8 DOHC engine pumps out 400 horsepower at 5800 rpm and 413 pounds-feet of torque at 4000 rpm. It is mated to a smooth-shifting 7-speed auto gear box. Tow capacity? An astonishing 8,500 pounds. The four-wheel-drive system can be driven in auto, 2WD, 4Hi or 4Lo modes depending on road and weather conditions. Up front and in the rear is an independent double wishbone suspension with stabilizer bars and shock absorbers. The power-assisted, rack-and-pinion steering is accurate and direct. Stopping power is left up to the massive 13.8-inch front and rear vented disc brakes.

LOOK & FEEL: We test drove the top Platinum model with chrome accents on the bold and familiar Nissan grille, door handles, exterior mirrors and exhaust tip. Huge LED headlights and fog lamps stand out as you approach the SUV. The dark-painted, side-step rails come in handy for the little tykes for ingress and egress. Space is at a premium (make that Platinum!) in



the full-size Armada with storage areas in the center console, overhead console and doors. Want cargo space to haul plywood from the local home improvement store? Then fold flat the second-row seat. Or press a button and watch the 60/40 third-row seat fold flat to open up 95.4 cubic feet of space (that's with both second and third row seats down). Wood trim on the doors and the dashboard above the glove box conveys a tasteful appearance. Also notable are a leather-wrapped steering column and shifter knob, 12.3-inch touch infotainment display, 13-speaker Bose audio, dual auto a/c, 10-way power heated/cooled driver and eightway passenger quilted leather seats, power

slide/tilt moon roof and liftgate and nine total cup/bottle holders!

OUT THE DOOR: \$68,300, plus tax, tag, delivery and destination charges.

BY THE NUMBERS: Tires, 275/50R22 all-season; wheelbase, 121.1 inches; length, 208.9 inches; fuel capacity, 26 gallons; city, 13 mpg; highway, 18 mpg; Web site: www.nissanusa.com

WHY DIG IT: Lots of room for passengers and cargo as well as commendable tow capacity backed by a robust engine. What's there not to like? If you looked past the fuel economy figures (we eked out just 14 mpg in combined driving), this full-size SUV should serve the needs of large households quite well.

OVERHAULED 2022 INFINITI QX60 OOZES LAVISHNESS

THE RIDE: Four-door, six- or seven-passenger mid-size 2022 Infiniti OX60 AWD.

DOWN THE ROAD: After a hiatus in 2021, the QX60 is back, all redesigned but retaining its power train. Based on an all-steel frame, the power in the Infiniti is plenty to push the 4,655-pound plus vehicle. The luxurious ride is quiet and graceful whether you are on the highway or testing the Infiniti's off-road prowess.

TECH & PERFORMANCE: Under the hood sits a 3.5-liter V-6 engine putting out 295 horsepower @ 6400 rpm and 270 poundsfeet of torque @ 4800 rpm. It is now coupled with a 9-speed auto, replacing the previous continuous variable transmission. Tow capacity is creditable at 6,000 pounds. THE BRIDGE TO COLLEGE

THINGS THAT MATTER IN ADMISSIONS ... KINDA

By ROBERT LEVINE



After 37 years of being involved in college and graduate admissions, I cannot count the number of times I have answered a question with "It depends." Here are some answers to the vexing questions we are asked on a daily basis.

Do Rankings Matter? Once in the while, rankings indicate something valuable. Most of the time, they indicate only that admissions is big business. For medium and large schools (most small colleges avoid being part of the rankings game), rankings usually indicate an effort by

a school to prove its worth to you, and the results are inconsistent. For example, U.S. News currently ranks the University of Washington as the 59th best college in America but the 7th best college in the world! How is that possible? Each ranking uses a different formula. So, when you look at rankings, realize you're being marketed more than informed.

Do Grades Matter? How you did in school is the best indicator of how you will do in school. However, everybody knows that students like to play GPA games. Many take easy courses to get high grades. Many take dual enrollment and other non-traditional courses to "benefit" from higher weighting. These tricks are obvious to – and not favored by – admissions offices. In fact, top grades are not the single most significant factor used by highly selective schools.

Does Academic Rigor Matter? Colleges do not expect applicants to take all the most rigorous courses. In fact, the statistical difference between more and fewer AP courses is surprisingly small, and many top high schools limit the number of high level IB courses to three per semester. Students should challenge themselves in areas that are relevant to their interests and futures, but taking rigorous courses just for the sake of taking rigorous courses is not a winning strategy. Besides, taking a class is just absorption, not a pioneering intellectual effort.

Do Standardized Test Scores Matter? For the most selective schools, higher is better, but highest is not required. Stanford rejects an alarming number of perfect test scores in favor of students with other contributions. Even for medical school, where the MCAT seems to be the scariest thing this side of an apocalypse, we have seen students with lower test scores – in the 60th percentile – achieve great results because of other factors (including really good essays). And for undergraduate admissions in private colleges, "test optional" is likely here to stay.

Does Direct Experience Matter? If you're applying to a graduate school, a U.K. university, or a specialized program, direct experience matters. Otherwise, while some experience in an academic or career direction is indicative of interest, "more" is not always the same as "better."

Does Leadership Matter? A title may indicate popularity or seniority, but being president or captain but does not necessarily indicate world-class achievement. Don't just be something; do something.

Does Service Matter? In a world where everyone is expected to perform some kind of service, the absence of service is a red flag. However, schools do not count service hours to differentiate between applicants. What matters to the applicant is what matters to the admissions office.

Does Athletics Matter? While it is true that "a strong body leads to a strong mind," it is also true that alumni who were physically active during college donate money at a rate of three times more than the rest. You don't have to be an Olympian but do something to indicate you are not limited to mental pursuits.

Do Recommendation Letters Matter? An average recommendation letter will lead to a below-average admissions result. Focus on your relationship with the recommender; it's the caliber of the letter, not the caliber of the writer, that matters. Once there was a student who received a recommendation letter from the President of Georgetown ... but did not get in to Georgetown.

Do Interviews Matter? A great interview won't get you admitted if the rest of your application isn't impressive, but great interviews do help differentiate between those who are "in the running" at the final stages of the selection process.

Does Being a Legacy Matter? Schools give great attention to children of alumni, but some alumni are more important than others. If the parent has contributed to the school over the years – either with money or time and effort – then another long-term contribution by the applicant can be expected. However, if there hasn't been much contribution ...



der the Cove "The Lost Man of Bombay" (376 pages; \$26.99) by Vaseem Khan; published by Hodder

& Stoughton (www.hodder.co.uk) It all began with "Midnight at Malabar House,"


followed by "The Dying Day" and now "The Lost Man of Bombay." Detective Persis Wadia returns in Vaseem Khan's latest, a historical crime series featuring India's first female police inspector. This recent book is also set in 1950 Bombay though it starts with the body of a man found frozen in the Himalayan foothills near Dehra Dun. The mysterious death

circumstances of "the Ice Man" circle back to Bombay as Inspector Wadia and Scotland Yard criminalist Archie Blackfinch attempt to


uncover a trail leading directly into the dark heart of conspiracy. If one death isn't enough, an Italian industrialist, his Indian wife, and a German monk are murdered in Bombay, raising questions about Europeans being targeted by a serial killer. Making matters worse is Persis' inept senior colleague, Hemant Oberoi, who rushes to arrest an innocent man and begins taking credit for solving the case. Detective Wadia takes off for Dehra Dun to pursue further leads. In the bazaar, "she discovered a primordial chaos, as frantic as a seaport:

cries of chaiwallahs and fruit sellers mingled with the shrieks of langurs and the baying of stray dogs; young women spun silk parasols in their hands as they flirted with handsome soldiers from the academy ..." Other interesting characters are the inspector's wheelchair-bound father Sam, who owns a bookshop, his old friend Dr. Shaukat Aziz, and Auntie Nessie who desperately wants her niece to tie the knot. Indeed, the book brings the Bombay of the 1950s, now Mumbai, back to life as the author notes, "The Bombay Secretariat, a four-hundredfoot-long building designed in the Venetian Gothic style, with a façade of arcaded verandas in Porbander stone and a tower as imposing as the top hat of an Englishman out on the town ..." or Elephanta Island: "a lonely stub of tide-tormented rock lying ten kilometres out in the city's harbour,



bursting with color, stately homes, sidewalks lit by tall, yellow gaslights,' notes March. Jim, a detective for the Dupree Agency, is dispatched to Chicago to probe the murder of one of the agency's investigators. For five weeks, there is no word from her husband. Restless and impatient, Diana takes off for the Midwest city. Amid the ruckus, Chicago is gearing up for the World's Fair Columbian Exposition, a massive display of science and industry exhibits stretching for miles. Meanwhile, in the underbelly of the city docks, warehouses and taverns, Jim mingles with a plethora of characters

that include union members, steel mill workers, immigrants and anarchists, who are hell bent on blowing up the fair. Jim, Diana and their loyal companions race against time to stop the armageddon from taking place. Though thousands of miles away, home is always on Diana's mind. Making an appearance in the story, and fittingly well we must say, are Jamsetji N. REMINISCING THOSE MOM FRIENDSHIPS OF THE PAST

I was hard at work at my desk in my home office one day, vaguely conscious of the suburban afternoon outside. Somewhere, someone mowed their lawn. The occasional car drove by. Birds fluttered and chirped lazily in the heat. Focused on the clicking of my computer keyboard and the words taking shape on my screen, I felt rather than heard the tempo of the day shift. Our neighborhood elementary school had let out. Kids skipped and ran or biked down the sidewalk, parents calling out to them to slow down in between the "uh huhs" as they listened to them chatter about their day.

Two women paused outside my window. "It was so nice to meet you," one exclaimed. "Yes!" the other responded, and I could hear the excitement in her voice. "We have to go home now, but we'll hang out later."

I know that voice. It was the voice of a mother who had found in the world.

I knew that voice. It was the voice of a mother who had found, in the words of Anne of Green Gables, a kindred spirit.

I remember being that mom, scoping out playgrounds and classrooms for The One who could help you get through the hour pushing a kid on the swing or waiting in the Kumon waiting room (pre-Covid). The one you could partner with backstage at India Fest in the thick of costumes and makeup. The one with whom you would wrap silent auction baskets or chaperone field trips or decorate cafeterias for year-end parties and graduation bashes.

In the grips of small-child parenting, I became adept at sizing up a potential buddy, mentally assessing the compatibility of the child and the friendliness of the (usually) mother. Sometimes all you wanted was adult conversation; common interests or background were a bonus. Some relationships were



temporary, yet deep, like the "ballet friend" I had when my older daughter was about four. We started chatting one day before class, and soon we got into the habit of saving a spot for each other in the corridor or waiting room and hanging out. The two of us had deep, personal conversations about life and family when our daughters were in class, but we never took it beyond the studio; in fact, we didn't even know each other's names and never exchanged numbers. Perhaps it was the relative anonymity of the relationship that allowed us to confide in each other this way. And when the season ended, we went our separate ways, though I still think about her and wonder what her child is up to nowadays.

Relationships like these helped me stay sane when my daughters were very young by providing me with islands of adult interaction in a child-heavy world. While some such connections vanished after the situation ended, others lasted. One friend met another mom at Gymboree when they were both there with their first babies. They hit it off instantly, dropped out of Gymboree and now have six kids and 16 years of close-knit friendship between them.

When you find the ones that you click with, it's such a joy. I've been fortunate enough that many mom friendships have continued even after our children have gone separate ways to different schools or acquired new interests. Some PTA moms with whom I spent hours in the trenches are among my closest friends, and we slip in and out of each other's orbits even if we don't meet as often as we used to. This decade or so of small-person parenting coincided with one of the largest influxes of new people into my circle, at least post-college days. It served the purpose of not just personal interaction, but of weaving me into the common fabric of our community and bestowing upon me the warmth of belonging.

Now that my children are older and I don't have as much day-to-day involvement in their school lives, the opportunities to encounter their friends' parents are fewer. The kids do their own thing socially. The older one either drives herself or is picked up by friends, and even the younger one hops out of the car with a backward wave. While the occasional new mom friend enters my orbit, I spend more time managing existing friendships than acquiring new ones.

Listening to those two women outside that afternoon, I wonder what it will be like for them. I wonder if they'll spend hours in the playground or at the pool together, or volunteer together, or sip cocktails as they trick-or-treat around the neighborhood. I hope they enjoy their time together — whether it's for an afternoon, a season, a few years — or forever.

VERY NEARSIGHTED? THIN CORNEAS? DRY EYES? NO PROBLEM

The Food and Drug Administration has approved a new technology called EVO ICL to help patients with extreme nearsightedness, dry eyes and thin corneas to see without glasses and contact

Among the first in the world, I have been involved with ICL technology since early 1990s when it was designed by a Russian company. It caused a paradigm shift in eye surgery by helping people with extreme glasses prescriptions see without glasses/lenses. We had shared our experience with different varieties of

these Phakic implants (lens implants that are placed in the eye while you still have your natural crystalline lens) produced and invented in different parts of the world like the French "Domilens," Japanese

"Momose" Lens and Dutch "Worst" Lens.

The original Phakic implant underwent numerous advances over decades to become successful as the FDA approved, Vision ICL (Implantable Collamer Lens) for nearsighted patients who are not candidates for Lasik surgery. This technology did involve the need to make an opening in the patient's iris (laser or surgical) for safety and prevention of induced glaucoma. The recent FDA nod allows for this already successful ICL technology that does not need that uncomfortable procedure so patients can enjoy vision with least intrusion.

Like a miniature contact lens, it is surgically implanted into the eye to correct the nearsighted vision and even astigmatism and you won't feel it or need to maintain/clean once it is in the eye. The surgery is brief (minutes) and performed with just numbing drops and no stitches and permanently eliminates the need for patients to remove or replace lenses every day.

The material this ICL is made of is Collamer, which contains collagen that is biocompatible with the eye (and hence not rejected inside the eye) and provides exceptional quality of vision. That's because it is placed close to the nodal point of the eye's refractive system, which sometimes even provides vision better than patient's glasses or contact

As long as you are more than 21 years of age and stable in refraction and your natural lens is clear (not a cataract) and have had no history of diseases such as glaucoma, iritis or diabetic retinopathy or any severe anatomical dysfunction, you could be a candidate.

If you have the following conditions that prevent you from being a candidate for Lasik eye surgery, ICL technology is ideal for extreme and even normal nearsightedness:

High nearsightedness: Since there is a limit to how much tissue can be removed during Lasik surgery, the ICL safely corrects all the nearsightedness and even associated astigmatism.

Thin corneas: The front clear, viewfinder of your eyes that Lasik surgery is performed on is completely bypassed since the ICL technology is placed inside the eye.

Dry eyes: Since there is no cutting of a corneal layer or disturbance of the nasociliary nerves, the ICL is ideal for patients with dry eyes.


Besides the straightforward nearsighted cases, I have even combined ICL with Lasik surgery in extreme cases, and additionally, used it in certain Keratoconus cases as an off-label indication.

Though safety and efficacy of this technology has been documented by over a million cases outside of USA before FDA approval, there can be side effects in some cases like glaucoma, inflammation or residual astigmatism. These can be treated successfully and ICL even removed as a reversible option, if needed.

One more important factor to understand is that as you age and develop a cataract (previous Khaasbaat article), ICL technology can be easily taken out during cataract surgery. You can then proceed with premium lens implants in most cases to enjoy vision without glasses permanently.

Find out if you are candidate for the new EVO ICL technology and have a no-maintenance contact lens inside your eyes.

INSIDE CREATIVE VORTEX



Artists seek inspiration for their paintings from a variety of sources, including immediate surroundings and imagination. Industrialized objects such as automobiles, high-rise buildings with hard edges, harsh lines, bold colors and sharp angles were a main inspiration for artists that were a part of the Vorticism movement. The movement was an artistic reaction resulting from the increase in progress that was being witnessed in their culture. The artists' works were highlighting the happenings of their own urban environment. Vorticism was a short movement that lasted only for

a few years, from 1914 to 1920, when World War I began and brought the movement to an end. Additionally, the undertaking was emerging in Britain during the same time as Futurism was gaining popularity in Italy. Both movements found inspiration in the simple shapes of the industrialized cityscape and depicted the dynamism, energy and movement of modern life.


Vorticism was first founded by Wyndham Lewis, who focused on depicting the speed, movement, business and emotionlessness of urban life. He created complex geometrical figures that evoked both dynamism and stillness. Lewis was tired of what he saw as the pretentions of the British art world and sought to pave a way for work that better reflected the modern and ever-changing world.




Crossing the Bridge by Brinda Pamulapati, 18 x 24 inches Acrylic on canvas

To me, Vorticism represents the energy of the artist after absorbing all the immediate visual scenes that we are presented with. This intake results in a passionate and creative blast of ideas filled with energy and movement that are translated onto the canvas. In my recent solo art exhibition, "Revitalization" at Venvi Art Gallery, my new abstract paintings were more inclined to this style of vorticism. Like the Vorticists' works, they convey dynamic shapes and scenes but instead of the urban environment, they emerge from my imagination and the vortex of desire and knowledge inside. This internal and external creative process has resulted in a series aimed at breadth ranging from mixed media using Indian saree in abstract style to energetic abstractions.

GAS-SIPPER NISSAN SENTRA IS AN INEXPENSIVE, ENJOYABLE CAR

Redesigned two years ago, the 2022 Nissan Sentra continues to be an alluring ride. It can be even more if you opt for the brand-new Midnight Edition package, which comes with lovely black exterior trim and black 18-inch aluminum-alloy wheels. The powertrain maintains its status quo, which means the small sedan boasts a spirited, great-to-drive attitude, with speedy acceleration and nimble handling/balance.

A 2.0-liter direct-injection inline-4 cylinder engine puts out 149 horsepower @ 6400 rpm and 146 pounds-feet of torque @ 4400 rpm. Our test drive was mated to a fairly silent continuous variable transmission. An up front strut suspension and a rear multilink system soak obstacles with skill and self-assurance. Providing positive on-center response is an electric power steering. Want to save on gas as fuel prices go up the roof? Turn on the green eco button to the left of the steering wheel. Boomerang-shaped reflector LED headlights flank the dark chrome V-motion grille to portray a forceful look. Boosting the appearance further are lower body side sill extensions, black-painted outside mirrors, and a rear spoiler and chrome tip. The practical cabin is plentiful with creature comforts such as dual auto a/c, flat-bottomed and tilt/telescopic steering column, 60/40 split fold rear seat, leather steering wheel and shifter, power-slide

moon roof, overhead sunglass holder, Apple CarPlay and Android Auto and six-speaker audio. The 7-inch Advanced Drive-Assist, located between tachometer and speedometer, displays vital info. Trunk space is an admirable 14.3 cubic feet. We recommend opting for the SR Premium Package, which will fetch you such wonderful features as thin projector LED headlights, power sliding glass moonroof with tilt feature, heated steering wheel and front seats, six-way power driver's seat with two-way power lumbar, 8-speaker Bose premium audio, among others.

Dual front and side airbags, side airbag curtain for both rows, front knee airbags, vehicle dynamic and traction control systems, fourwheel antilock brakes with electronic brake distribution and brake assist, blind spot and lane departure warnings, rear-cross traffic alert, auto emergency brake with pedestrian detection, tire pressure monitoring system, three-point front seat belts with pretensioners, rearview camera and daytime running lights are standard.

Slotted between the smaller Versa and the Altima sedan, the reasonably priced and fuelefficient Sentra responds with agility and grip in all driving conditions. First-time owners, please put this pleasant and energetic car at the top of your list to test drive. You won't be disappointed.

REDESIGN MAKES 2022 OUTLANDER AN IRRESISTIBLE RIDE!

That Outlander you may have driven or heard about in the past, toss it all out. The all-new, fourth-gen Mitsubishi compact SUV has been reborn with a fresh power train, extended fascia and an almost luxury-like cabin. Essentially, it is now taller, longer, wider opening up more legroom space for rear-seat passengers. And make that a seven-seater with a third row!

Sharing a chassis and power train with its corporate cousin Nissan Rogue, the 2022 Outlander is equipped with a 2.5-liter, inline-4 cylinder engine that puts out 181 horsepower @ 6000 rpm and 181 pounds-feet of torque @ 3600 rpm. However, the slightly noisy continuous variable transmission continues as is to our detriment. Our test vehicle had the Super All-Wheel Control (S-AWC), so it would be more than a relief if it were taken off the beaten path such as gravel, mud and even snow if you drive up north this winter. A MacPherson strut front and multilink rear suspension handles uneven bumps on the road with confidence. The electric power steering conveys an immediate and communicative feel. No doubt, the Outlander sports a fresh look with horizontal LED headlights and fog lamps, flanking what the Japanese carmaker terms



a "dynamic shield" grille with the familiar Mitsubishi emblem. The rear too shows off a horizontal-themed T-shaped tailgate. The cabin is now even roomier with plentiful head and leg room for second-row seat passengers. Space in the third row, found only in another small SUV, the VW Tiguan, is miniscule. The analog instrument cluster of speedometer and tachometer with silver accents hosts digital fuel and temperature gauges. Several comforts are offered such as tri-zone auto a/c, thick-rimmed leather tilt/telescopic steering wheel, eight-



way driver and four-way power and heated front-passenger seats, 9-inch infotainment touchscreen display, panoramic sunroof, power liftgate, 12.3-inch digital display and power windows.

Though deficient in power, the four-cylinder and brand-new Outlander is a tempting proposition. After all, it makes up for the deficit with considerable cargo and passenger space, decent fuel mileage (our mixed driving average was around 26.8 mpg) and a price that isn't astronomical, so to speak.


