TAMPA YOUTH HOLDS BIKE DRIVE FOR NEEDY










CANCER - PART X: THE FINAL JOURNEY

oxygen. He looked grey and emaciated. That was the time both the patient and the physician decided to consult hospice.

In the life of many cancer patients, a day comes when the patient realizes that the cancer has spread diffusely all over the body and there is no hope for curing or even controlling the disease anymore. The sad realization that the end game has started dawns on the doctor and the patient. This is also associated with an increase in the symptoms, pain being a dominant one. It becomes clear that meaningful survival is not possible and the patients become naturally depressed and anxious. At this stage, not only they need symptom relief but encouragement as well. It is important that the patients know they are not alone in their final journey. Recurring symptoms like pain, nausea, vomiting and fatigue are enough for the doctor to find means of making the patient's life happy.

In the beginning, cancer specialists and surgeons found it difficult to accept failure when they were unable to cure a cancer patient. Often, pain-relieving drugs were denied to patients saying it would lead to addiction and further deterioration and suffering. It took a kind-hearted nurse-trained British physician, Dame Cecily Saunders, to start the movement in 1967 to restore sanity and sanctity to the end-of-life care for cancer patients. These end-stage cancer patients were treated as pariahs both in oncology wards and their homes! In response to this injustice Saunders invented 'palliative medicine,' the goal of which was to give comfort care for terminally ill patients and help them die painlessly and gracefully.

'Palliation' simply means easing a terminally ill patient's pain and suffering and attending to their emotional and spiritual needs at the end of life. Dr. Saunders would physically remove these patients from the oncology wards and transfer them to a hospice center called St. Christopher Hospital in London. It would take another 10 years before hospice could cross the ocean and reach the U.S. In forming 'hospice,' Dr Saunders made an extraordinary contribution to alleviate unnecessary surgery and suffering for these patients. Now, hospice care is available in every county, provided by a team of healthcare professionals. Often, the care is given at home, which makes it easier for the patient and the family but is also available in hospitals, nursing homes and now special Hospice centers.

It took some more time before palliative care was established in India. Till then, end-stage patients suffered a lot of difficulties, often subjected to religious constraints and other influences. It took an anesthesiologist Dr. C. Rajagopal to establish palliative care in India called "Pallium" and now every state has palliative care centers. As he correctly points out, "Every difficult journey is made easier when there is someone to walk beside you." How true! And his book, "Walk with the Weary," has become wildly popular and is a lesson in humanity in health care. Another great read is Paul Kalanithy's. book, "When breath becomes Air." This is a touching memoir of a neurosurgeon's valiant fight against advanced lung cancer and focuses precisely on the feelings of terminal cancer patients. And a third one is Atul Gawande's "Being Mortal" that addresses end-of-life care and hospice care, and also contains Gawande's reflections and personal stories.

Palliative care is universally available and one day in the year is

dedicated as "World Hospice and Palliative Care Day," an annual unified day of action to celebrate and support hospice and palliative care around the world. Thanks to all these advances, a terminally ill patient can live out his final days in comfort and peace, while being attended by loving relatives and friends.

UPDATE ON EB-5 LEGISLATION AND RECENT LITIGATION SETTLEMENT

The EB-5 immigrant investor program provides lawful permanent resident (LPR) status to foreign investors (and their spouses and unmarried children under age 21) who invest a specified amount of capital in a new commercial enterprise (NCE) in the United States that creates at least 10 jobs. Investors who choose a targeted employment area (TEA) — a rural area or area of high unemployment — qualify for reduced investment amounts. The law permits the admission of about 10,000 investors/qualifying relatives annually (7.1 percent of all employment- based visas).

EB-5 offers two pathways. In the standard or stand-alone pathway, foreign nationals invest in a new or existing enterprise that uses the capital for direct job creation. The second and more common pathway, the Regional Center Program, allows investors to pool investments into an NCE, which are typically used to fund a separate job-creating entity (JCE). Regional center investors may count indirect jobs toward the job creation requirement. The Regional Center Program was initially authorized as a pilot program and has never been made permanent; it must be regularly reauthorized. On June 30, 2021, its authorization expired and the program remained lapsed for nearly nine months, during which time USCIS did not process pending applications and rejected new applications associated with regional center investments.

EB-5 Reform and Integrity Act of 2022 (RIA)

In March 2022, Congress passed the EB-5 Reform and Integrity Act of 2022 (RIA) which reauthorized the Regional Center Program, and implemented a number of changes and requirements for investors and regional centers.

Capital Investment Requirements

Prior to the 2022 Act RIA, investment requirements remained unchanged from 1990 (\$1 million/\$500,000 in a TEA) until a 2019 federal regulation increased them (\$1.8 million/\$900,000 in a TEA). However, in June 2021, that rule was vacated by a federal district court and amounts reverted to those in place prior to 2019.

The 2022 Act set new requirements: minimum investments of \$1,050,000, or \$800,000 in a TEA or infrastructure project (see "TEAs," below). The new amounts reduce proportionally the discount for TEA investments from 50 percent to 24 percent. These amounts are to be adjusted for inflation every five years beginning January 1, 2027.

TEAs

Since the EB-5 category was enacted, the law has defined high unemployment areas as those that have experienced at least 150 percent of the national average unemployment rate. In the past, state officials would designate geographic or political subdivisions as areas of high unemployment. Certain such designations were subject to allegations of misuse by combining different areas.

Under the 2022 Act, only USCIS may designate high-unemployment TEAs,



which include the census tract or contiguous census tracts in which the NCE is principally doing business. The act specifies that the weighted average of the unemployment rate for the census tracts must be at least 150 percent of the national average.

Rural areas are areas outside Metropolitan Statistical Areas, as designated by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), or areas outside of cities and towns with populations less than 20,000, based on the most recent decennial census. The 2022 Act specifies that USCIS shall prioritize processing and adjudicating EB-5 petitions for regional center investments in rural areas. The 2022 Act specifies certain EB-5 immigrant visa set-asides for those who

invest in TEAs, including the following:
20 percent for gualified immigrants who invest in a rural area,

- 20 percent for qualified immigrants who invest in a rural are
 10 percent for qualified immigrants who invest in a high-
- To percent for qualified immigrants who invest in a highunemployment area, and

• 2 percent for qualified immigrants who invest in an infrastructure project. The 2022 Act defines an infrastructure project as a "capital investment project in a filed or approved business plan, which is administered by a governmental entity (such as a Federal, State, or local agency or authority) that is the job-creating entity contracting with a regional center or new commercial enterprise to receive capital investment ... as financing for maintaining, improving, or constructing a public works project."

Regional Center Program

The 2022 Act re-authorizes the Regional Center Program through Sept. 30, 2027. As a result, USCIS resumed processing regional center-based applications. Applications are subject to the law in place at the time of filing (e.g., investment requirements). In the event of a future lapse, the act directs USCIS to continue processing petitions filed before the expiration date. It also specifies parameters for indirect jobs, which may count toward 90 percent of the job creation requirement. USCIS interpreted the 2022 Act to mean that all previously designated regional centers were no longer authorized and required them to reapply for designation. Litigation regarding regional centers ensued. In June 2022, a federal district judge ordered USCIS to allow previously designated regional centers to continue participating in the EB-5 program while the litigation is pending, stating that USCIS's interpretation "was almost certainly legal error." On Aug. 24, 2022, the parties to this litigation entered into a settlement agreement that, among other things, rescinds USCIS's categorical deauthorization of Regional Centers (RCs) approved prior to the enactment of the EB-5 Reform and Integrity Act of 2022, allows these RCs to immediately file Project Applications, and requires USCIS thereafter to accept investor petitions associated with the project.

ALL-NEW AFFORDABLE FORD MAVERICK IS INDEED A REBEL!

Over the last few years, we have driven hundreds of vehicles but nothing comes close to the value, price and fuel economy offered by the all-new Maverick. And that is not an understatement. Check this out. The first full hybrid compact pickup in the United States starts under \$20k, seats five comfortably in a spacious cabin and best of all touts over 42 mpg in city. You just can't beat that! The only problem? Well, Ford cannot produce enough Mavericks since the demand, understandably so, is relentless. Pre-orders should be open soon for the 2023 model year, we are told.

Under the hood of our hybrid version sits a 2.5liter Atkinson-cycle 4-cylinder engine putting out 162 horsepower @ 5600 rpm and 155 poundsfeet of torque @ 4000 rpm. Add a 94 kW electric motor to the mix for a boost in hp by 29. The impressive pickup is coupled with a flawless electronic continuous variable transmission. OVERHAULED SUBARU WRX IS AN ATTRACTIVE PROPOSITION

Its kind are few and far between. It only has to be noticed by potential buyers and they would line up to buy one, i.e. the Subaru WRX. The totally redesigned high-performance sports sedan for 2022 is a fun and enjoyable ride, especially for your daily roundabout. Standard all-wheel-drive system should be an impetus on top of it all.

Out goes the previous 2.0-liter to be replaced by a more potent 2.4-liter horizontallyopposed 4-cylinder engine (intercooled and turbocharged) that blasts off a healthy 271 horsepower (up by 3 from previous) @ 5600 rpm and 258 pounds-feet of torque @ 5200 rpm. Power routed through a flawless 6-speed manual auto gear box contributes to a sporty and exciting performance. The WRX's exceptional stopping power comes from robust 12.4-inch ventilated front and 11.4-inch solid rear discs.

Ensconced on the unitized body structure is a traditional hexagonal grille with centered Subaru star cluster insignia, which is flanked by C-shaped LED headlights. You cannot help but notice the bulging but functional and broad scoop atop the aluminum hood. A twin cockpit with electroluminescent gauge displays for speedometer, tachometer, fuel

SAVE 'BIG' ON FUEL WITH 2022 KIA NIRO PHEV

As gas prices continue to hover around \$3.50 in Florida, you would be remiss not to take a glance or two at the 2022 Kia Niro PHEV (Plug-in hybrid electric vehicle). Essentially, the PHEV adds an electric charge that enables the five-passenger compact crossover to go up to 26 miles without using gas. The charge port, located in the driver's side front fender, uses a 240-volt system that can take 2½ hours or a 120-volt consuming about nine hours. You can effectively go around 530 miles on a tank (11.4 gallons) with its gas, hybrid and plug-in electric features.

A 1.6-liter, 4-cylinder gasoline engine is mated to an electric motor (60 horsepower), which is powered by an 8.9 kWh lithium-ion polymer battery weighing 258 pounds. That is adequate enough to put out a total of 139 hp while paired to a laudable 6-speed dual clutch transmission. The crossover offers a regenerative braking system for additional fuel savings. When the ride is coasting or the brakes are applied, the electric power functions as a generator, capturing kinetic energy that would normally be lost as heat through the brakes. Instead, it converts the energy into useable electricity for recharging the battery.

And if you like physical buttons for audio volume, tune, temp control, this is yours to keep! Other standard niceties



include dual auto a/c, 60/40 fold rear seat, flatbottomed leather steering column, aluminum alloy pedals, 11-speaker Harman Kardon sound system, and rear seat armrest with dual cup holders.



DEAR MOM AND DAD – CHILL!

Oh, the joys of admissions season: writing essays, completing applications, interviews, schoolwork, extracurricular activities, no sleep ...

You can cut the tension with a knife. The screaming? Some of it is audible; most of it is constantly bouncing through your head.

It's only the most important moment in a young life, right?

Well, no, college admissions is not the end of the world, nor is it the beginning. It's just an opportunity to collect choices for your education.

How you actually perform in college will matter much more.

Nevertheless, we understand the pressure. So how can parents help their students?

Let's start with what not to do. High schoolers are already stressed about their college efforts. School counselors have assemblies, instructions, and one-on-one meetings with their students. Already bombarded by homework and projects and papers, seniors are all talking about college essays. Every day, those scary deadlines creep closer and closer.

So, parents, how about we don't add our own stress to theirs?

After working with literally thousands of students, I can confidently say this: mood affects performance, and performance affects results. When students are stressed and rushed and distracted, they don't write great essays. Although it may seem natural to ensure that your child is doing the work timely – and it is important – how you interact with them, and how you act around them, either heightens or mitigates their stress.

Let your student know that you are there for them, but don't try to be part of the process in any significant way. Ask them what they want (and don't want) from you. Tell them you'd like to see a reasonable schedule and that you'd like them to keep you informed, then step back. You can lead a horse to water, but you cannot make the horse drink. Even if you push the horse's nose into the water ... does that really work? It's the same thing with kids.

Seven months ago, UCA presented a Town Hall webinar featuring four students (all of whom achieved lvy League schools). When asked to give advice to parents of the next class of college applicants, every one of them loudly and vociferously said "Leave us alone! Leave us alone! You're not helping! Please stop!" And their body language was, shall we say, energetic. If you'd like to see a recording of that webinar, contact us (info@universitycoa.com).

Yet parents can and should do more than "nothing." Be a good role model. During times of stress, your disposition will be their guide.

Be happy and healthy. Take a moment to relax. Do those things that make you vital. Instead of imparting your stress upon them, add to their confidence by showing an optimistic attitude. Smile once in a while! You can do it!

If and when you review your student's essays, don't look for problems, or at least don't emphasize the problems when speaking with your child. Instead of "I don't like this," try something like "Well, that's pretty interesting. Yes, you're on to something. I wonder: in this paragraph, could you add something like this, or maybe rebalance it in this way? I think that might make it even better." Or maybe try this: "I keep tripping on this one word. What other word could you use here?" Be mindful of what you say; it impacts their mood and their motivation.

There is another moment that will become very important for the harmony of your family: the day of the college's decision. For the most selective schools, the odds are against everyone. Be prepared to be supportive of your child if things do not go well. Give them attention, give them space, give them encouragement, do whatever it takes, but be a good role model with your words and your actions.

And, if things do go well, please be respectful of the fact that things do not go well for most people. Admissions is very competitive. Be a good winner, and support those who did not achieve their dream schools. Be happy, but do not be obnoxious. At all levels, be a good member of your community.

Again, admissions is neither the beginning nor the end of the world. The colleges make decisions for their best interests, not yours. Focus on raising a great human being and everything will work out well.

Just try to be chill.




"China Room" (246 pages; \$27) by Sunjeev Sahota; published by Viking (Penguin Random House) (www.penguinrandomhouse)

Longlisted for the 2021 Booker Prize, the title of this multigenerational tale is not much of a giveaway, rather a place where Mehar, Harbans and Gurleen spend their time. It is 1920s rural Punjab and the trio are married to three brothers but kept in the dark as to who their husbands are by a domineering mother-in-law Mai. "They live in the china room, which sits at a slight remove

domineering mother-in-law Mai. "They live By Mith and the china room, which sits at a slight remofrom the house and is named for the old willow-pattern plates that lean on a high stone shelf, a set of six that arrived with Mai years ago as part of her wedding dowry." Flash forward to 1990s when an 18-year-old from England rides out his withdrawal from drug addiction in the family's ancestral home, i.e., his great grandmother Mehar's. The son of an immigrant shopkeeper, he has experienced racism, violence and falling-out from the culture of his birth to seek a perilous form of escape – heroin. He is fascinated and troubled by his short stay as he pens his story some time later. "The morning mist was dove-grey and light and lifting away from the fields ... What remained was a feeling of quiet rapture, of dawn colours slowly involving themselves with the day, a champagne brightness starting to warm my skin and the waving acres of corn and wheat, the soft green hills that followed no pattern, a distant stone hut that held the horizon and a long tapered track driving on until I couldn't even imagine that I could see it." own family account, "China Room" casts a spotlight on the controlling traditions and horrendous atrocities committed on women in the 1920s. "Breaking up blocks of jaggery. Picking cotton. Picking guavas. Collecting dung. Shovelling




ashes. Cutting Mai's corns. Milking. Cooking. Preparing for the cooking. Dyeing salwars. Ironing dhotis. Sweeping the yard. Watering the yard. Draining the yard. Polishing the plates. Going to market. Going to temple. Going to pray for sons and for the long life of their husbands." Family, infidelity, bigotry, gender-power, identity, love, faith, secrets, survival, belonging, debt, are some of the issues tackled in this hauntinglywritten intimate account by Sahota, who also wrote the Booker Prize finalist "The Year of the Runaways."

THE ART OF INDIAN TEXTILES

India is host to a variety of textile arts. Handwoven textiles, block printing and fabric dyeing is loved among Indians as well as others from around the world. Major economic interests center around the relationships between the agriculture, textile-crafting and artists of this artform.

Each textile and design are region-based and mastered over generations. The final product involves a lot of labor and skill. Though recent modern technologies have reduced the hard labor work, it still requires a time-consuming and lengthy learning process; it is an artform that cannot be mastered from a college degree. The younger generations must be

trained and immersed in the culture from a young age to learn and create these intricate designs.

The textiles are organically made with environmentally friendly materials and dyes. We will be discussing a few of the weaving techniques utilized to craft the characteristic Indian textiles.

Examples of Weave Styles

The Kimkhab weave is an opulent, highly decorated style originating from the Uttar Pradesh region. Inspired by Islamic art, it utilizes natural elements in its design, focusing on objects such as flowers, birds and trees. As with many weave styles, golden embroidery known as zari acts as an added distinction of ornateness.

The Kasavu weave is recognizable from its ivorycolored base, embellished with golden lace weaving. This style, which originated in Kerala, is highly regarded in the state. The vertical zari embellishments are most often designed as cross bars or with geometric motifs.


The Venkatagiri weave is known for its durability. A popular style founded in Andhra Pradesh, this weave is made up of a blend of cotton and silk using pit looms. The resulting textile is soft and breathable, decorated with Jamdani motifs.

Keeping traditions alive

Within the current global landscape, the increase of fast-paced consumer consumption has left the traditions of Indian hand-weaving at a standstill. Therefore now — more than ever — there is a need to preserve this historic artform, not only for its cultural importance, but for its positive environmental impact.

One way that the practice of textile-making can be preserved is by redesigning the materials to suit contemporary fashion trends and the convenience of people.

As an artist myself, I've captured elements of Indian textiles designs in my collection of works titled "Saree Series." "Kanchi Saree from Kanchipuram" and "Banaras Saree" – abstract styles - are fused with the characteristic textile weaves from the regions specified in each painting. In this series, a viewer who may not have any prior knowledge of Indian textile design can gain a newfound appreciation for the craft. The traditional production of Indian textiles directly combats the ever-growing environmental pollutants from the fast-fashion industry. Crafting durable, long-lasting clothing with natural fibers is at the core of Indian textiles production. Groups such as the Isha Foundation's "Save The Weave" movement

educate the public on the importance of this historic craft and advocate for funding and support to Indian textile makers. Supporting these products helps combat environmental pollution, and celebrates a longstanding, highly revered artform.
